

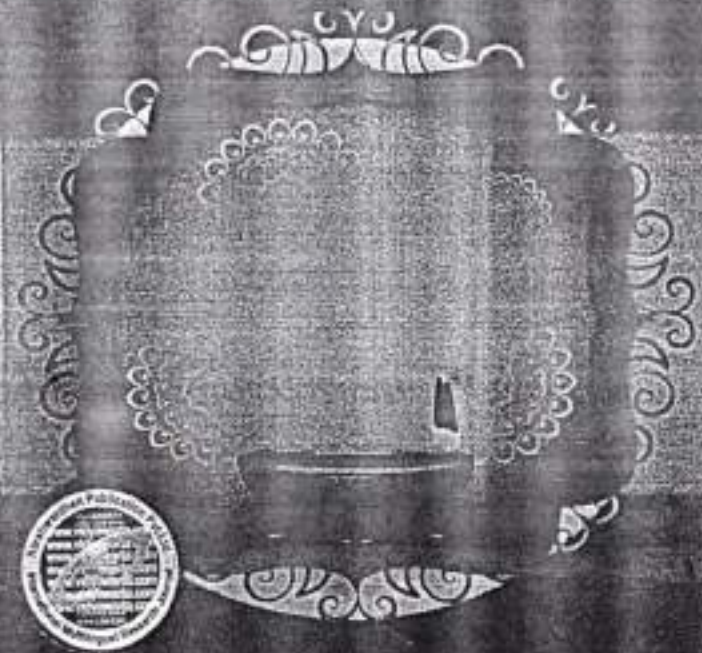
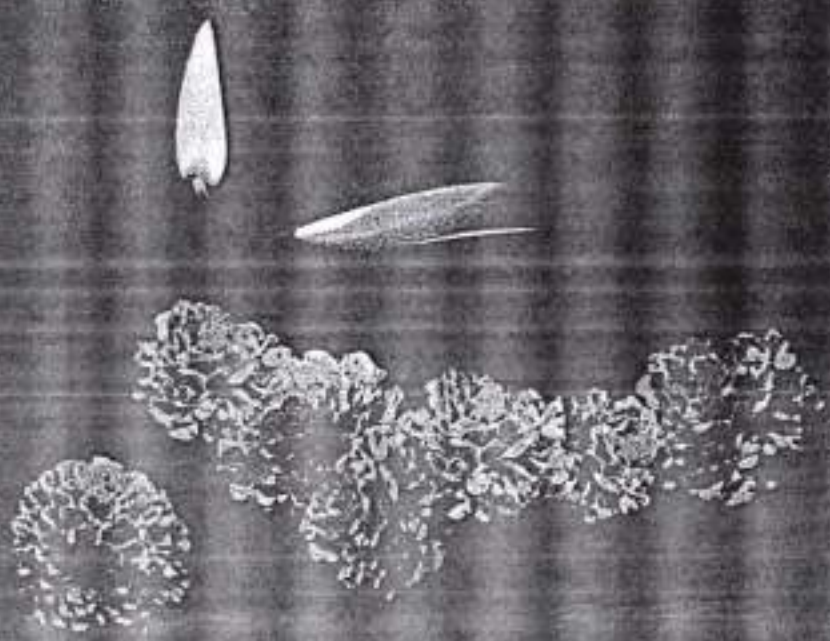


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Critical study of Concept and challenges before Democracy: Special Reference to Indian Democracy
