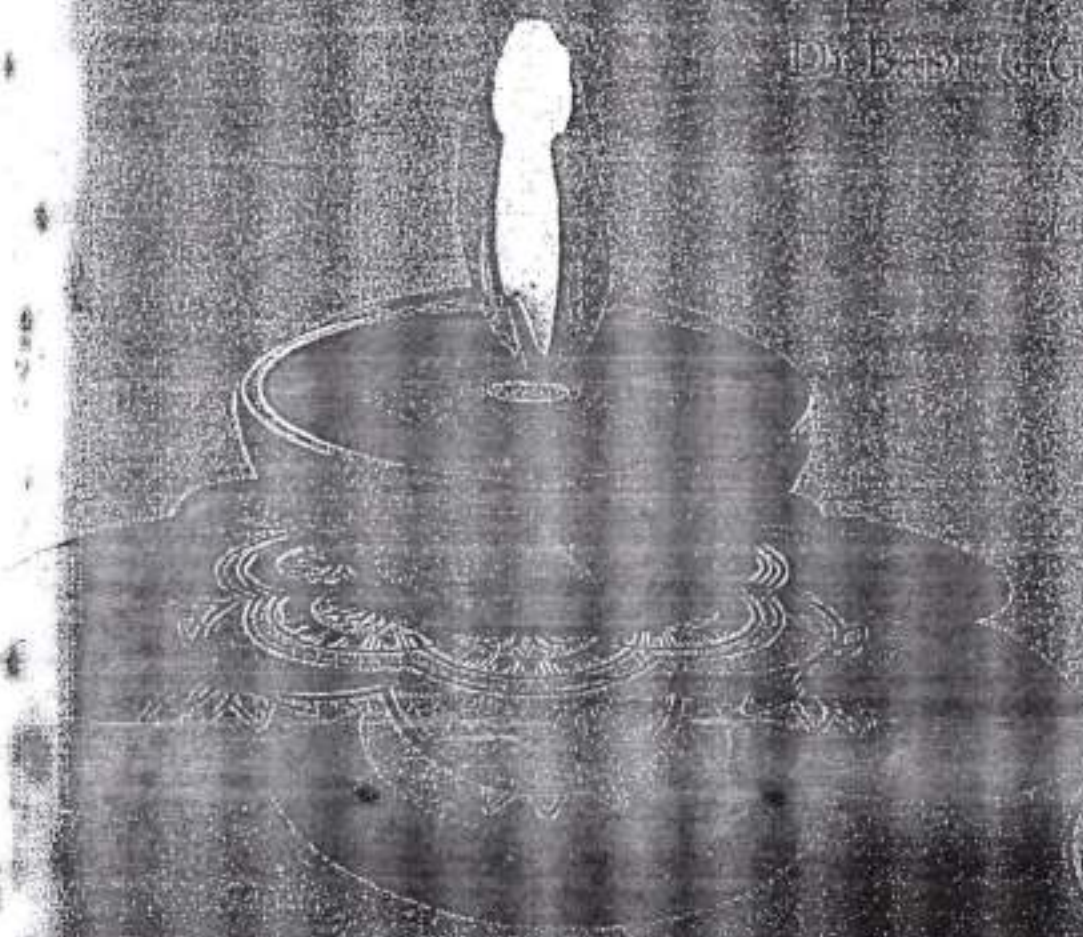

Women Empowerment is a Necessity of the Contemporary World: Special Reference to Indian Political Process.

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Abstract:

India and most of the countries in Asia got freedom in the 1950s, after the independence, India had adopted constitutional democracy. The Indian constitution holds that there are equal opportunities and rights for every citizen. Every citizen has to choose his representatives through elections. Elections are held regularly as per constitutional provisions, supported by various statutes made by Parliament of India from time to time. The main statute is a representation of the People Act, 1950. According to this Act any Indian citizen, man or woman, who is registered as a voter and is over 25 years of age, is allowed to participate in the elections process of the Lok Sabha or State Legislative Assemblies.

For participation in the Rajya Sabha election process, the age limit of contestants should be above 30 years. The Indian election process from Loksabha to Panchayat is based on the principle of equality (Article 14 of the Indian Constitution). In India, any citizen over the age of 18 can vote in elections.

During the period of British rule in India, women were given the same right to vote as men had under the Government of India Act of 1935. After independence the same system was
