Yes. The institute has two management information systems. One is used for office automation supplied by CMS and the other is LIBMAN, operating the library automation. The MIS used for office automation i.e. CMS is operational in three modules - 1. Admin, 2. Office, 3. Cash. The admin module has full control and access to all the data stored in the MIS. The office module stores all the data of students provided during admission, which enables to collect and segregate the student information as to category, place of residence, income, region, academic background, scores etc. It helps IQAC in identifying and diversifying the students based on their profile and various activities to be scheduled for quality sustenance and enhancement of the students. The present module also enables to issue various certificates including bonafide, character, transfer etc. It also enables to generate identity cards of students. The cash module is used to collect student fees and record the student data class wise, category wise, course wise which enables the office to generate fees receipts electronically. The report of data generated is used for statutory audit, government information. The fees collection then rooted to various estimates to be prepared by the committees for administration. The additional feature of this MIS, could enable the institution to conduct online examination during pandemic. The MIS used for library automation i. e. LIBMAN has four operational modules. 1. MIS reporting 2. Acquisition 3. Transaction 4. OPAC. The MIS reporting module is used to generate various reports required time to time. The Acquisition module is used to feed the data in regards to books newly added. The Transaction module enables the library to issue books by scanning on the barcode. The OPAC is used by students to find the required books by either title, author's name or publisher. The present MIS is utilise to generate the student data for

analysis of average transactions by the students, average requirement of particular title, number of transactions per day. It enables library to chalk out fixing the visiting days and hours class wise. Both the Management Information Systems are server based offline systems.

College is affiliated with Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University Nanded, a state University. Two faculty are working as Board of studies member, Principal of this college is invited member on Board of studies, thus college has ever active role in designing, development of curriculum. Besides that, all teachers are on the panel of paper setters of university, besides they are examiner, moderator of university examination. IQAC in the very beginning of syllabus, call for teaching plans from the respective faculties, a copy of academic calendar is readily available in the file of all faculty. IQAC regularly maintains Daily Teaching Report (DTR) which enables the IQAC to track the curriculum delivery. Before the end of syllabus a syllabus review meeting is conducted, which enable the IQAC to define strategy to plan for remedial coaching. Academic calendar is displayed on website for the students. End semester examination, continuous internal evaluation is an integral part of curriculum. Teaching plan, DTR enables the Institute to plan and conduct the syllabus in a time framed manner. Framing of academic calendar, and strictly adhering with it enables the institute to a well planned delivery and documentation of curriculum which evident from record maintained by IQAC.

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Continuous assessment is an indispensable part of curriculum under CBCS system. 25 Marks (1 credit) out of 100 marks (4 credits) of each course are reserved for performance in continuous assessment. Internal evaluation of the students are monitored by the concerned subject teacher. College is actively enforcing the continuous internal evaluation to courses like PG Diploma in Labor Law, Cyber Law, IPR, Taxation Laws, where monitoring continuous internal evaluation is not mandated by the university. The continuous internal evaluation system adopted, maintained and monitored by the college has helped the college faculty in deciding steps to be taken during pandemic. During pandemic, as per the Mandate of Bar Council of India, UGC, State Government of Maharashtra and the affiliating University policy the examination internal or ESE was decided to conducted online and in a altogether new format for students i.e. MCQ format. The IQAC has formed a task force to deal with this issue, and as per the mandate as decided in NAAC steering committee meeting, all the subject teachers were directed to submit a question bank of their respective subjects to be published on college website, which ultimately has helped the students in pandemic to get through the altogether new format of examination.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

IQAC committee at the beginning of the year prepares a proposed academic calendar of the various activities to be conducted by the college. The same is presented before IQAC in the first meeting of IQAC conducted in the academic year. An emphasis is given to organize each and every activity timely as per the academic calendar. The separate academic calendar prepared by the college is in line with the University academic calendar. The details as to commencement of classes, examinations, vacations are well designed by the university for uniform conduct, which is adhered to in the separate academic calendar prepared by the college. The academic calendar is then published on college website. All teachers are directed to submit their teaching plan before they start their syllabus, so that planning curricular and co-curricular activities are monitored. Due to global pandemic in the end of academic year, due to worldwide lockdown, it has become impossible to conduct the lecture in traditional form, however as the faculties were conversant with use of ICT, immediately after one week of declaration of lockdown, online classes by using Zoom Video Calling APP (Free Version) conducted by the faculty. Thus, completing the activities in a time bound manner and as per the academic calendar is always the priority of institution.

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BEST PRACTISE 1: LEGAL EDUCATION AT THE MINIMUM COST. THE CONTEXT: The
institute is running graduate and post graduate courses. The Institute has two
LLB programs, i.e., LL.B. (3 years) Degree course, and BA LLB (5 years) Degree
course. Besides, the institute conducts Six Post graduate programs, two LL.M.
(Business Law Criminal Law), four PG Diplomas i.e., Taxation Laws, Labour Laws,
  Cyber Laws, Intellectual Property Laws. The institute is recognized Ph.D.
 research centre in Law. The area where the college operates appears as urban
   however, the region i.e., Marathwada is draught prone, the localites are
  indulged in a normal day struggle for their existence. The region is badly
known for farmer's suicide. People residing in this area do not afford to pay
    huge fees towards education, higher education, thus drop out of higher
 education remains very high in the region. THE OBJECTIVES OF THE PRACTISE: -
 The institute works with a mission "Fiat justitia, ruat coelum", which means
 "Let Justice Be Done Though Heaven Falls". This mission is reflected through
   prospectus, website, citizens charter, college magazine. To fulfil this
 mission, the college is standing tall on all footings for the students from
marginal communities. Though being a single faculty college, the college has a
higher amount of student strength, one of the reasons behind students turning
to seek admission into this college, is the lowest amount of fees charged, that
  too with the excellent service. Thus, keeping in view of the mission, the
college has decided not to send any proposal of fees increase to the concerned
authority, whereas the neighbouring institute is charging double or triple fees
than this institute is charging. The institute fully believe in the context of
judgement as provided in M.P. Vashi Versus State of Maharashtra. THE PRACTISE:
- With this objective the institute has charged the lowest fees as compared to
 the other colleges in region. The fees charged for each course is mentioned
below. The fees charged as narrated below is such less that, student opting to
  choose another field turns to choose law as a career option. The institute
believes in providing all the facilities at minimum cost to the students. This
   reduced fee practise has become such an ideal practise that, students in
    general are choosing this institute over other institutes. On the same
   footings, the college does not charge any fine to the students for late
 submission of library books, non-wearing of uniform or fine as an action for

 PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED: - Due to reduced fees collection from the students, it
 becomes very hard for the college to maintain few things. However, that has
     never been an issue for the institute while designing curricular and
cocurricular activities. The institute has 2 Law programs i. e. LLB (3 years)
  degree programme BA LLB (5 years) degree programme, which is aided by the
Government of Maharashtra. The salary of the teaching and non-teaching staff of
   aided course is been managed by Government of Maharashtra, therefore the
 Tuition fees collected by the institute has to be repaid to the Government.
Whereas the expenses of non-Grant courses, are borne by the institution itself.
  On many occasions, it becomes very hard to manage the expenses, still the
   institute has never compromised with the quality of education. IMPACT OF
PRACTISE/ EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: - The impact of this practise resulted in less
 drop out, turning out after a gap of several year to complete the remaining
   portion of education. The resultant admission into the college has been
  increased. Students from marginal communities are regularly attending the
   college and taking education for their livelihood. Most of the students
  graduate from the institute report to have started their own practise and
    leading a happy life. RESOURCES REQUIRED: - Budgeting or finance is the
requirement of any educational institute to run the institute. The institute is
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managing its affairs in so less amount with full infrastructure. Library, the books in the library is the biggest resources available to institute to run academic courses. The library of college has more than 37000 books covering wide subjects. So, the college has adopted the practise to issue as many books required by the students. BEST PRACTISE 2: Think Global Act Local: Promotion of local language in curriculum delivery Legal language has its origin in Latin language, however, gradually it is developed in English. The legal system followed by we people in India, largely devolves from English system, accordingly the laws have been written in English, taught in English and studied in English by the students at large. However, Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University i. e. affiliating university has provided an option to the students of law to write their answers in regional language i. e. Marathi Language. Owing to this facility provided to the students of law, the institute has adopted a mechanism to adopt an inclusive policy with the name "Words of the day" which has started with an object that, the students in all should be able to know the legal terminologies with its Marathi meaning, THE CONTEXT: Marathwada region, the extreme backword region in Maharashtra state, is industrially under developed. College do not see any campus placement, owing to its cultural, educational, industrial backwardness. Thus, students graduating from this College mostly opts for court room practise, and thus selects lower court i. e. Court of JMFC or District Court as their place of practise. High Court being at a distant place, very few afford to start practise there. THE OBJECTIVES OF THE PRACTISE: - The institute has its stated vision, mission, goals and objectives as reflected in prospectus, website, citizens charter etc. The vision inter alia states Judiciam Dei, which means "Throne of Judgement", The Mission kept in mind always refers to "Fiat Justitia, ruat coelum", which means, "Let Justice be done though heaven falls." Thus, to fulfil this mission, the college has adopted a practise which enable the graduates who turn to Bar, are later referred as less experienced with the legal terminology with its local use. The students graduating with LL.B. degree are referred to not aware with the terminology used in the court. Moreover, the university curriculum does not provide Legal Language as one of the courses into the study. Therefore, the institute have planned to overcome, this defect, by providing an insight into the Marathi course to students of law. So that, by learning law in Marathi they shall develop a temper to study the law in English as well. THE PRACTISE: - As a matter of practise, college has installed a white board at the entry door of college. The white board is fixed at such a place, that every individual who enters the college, gets attracted towards the writing on the white board. The board use to consists of five legal terminology and one Latin maxim with its Marathi meaning every alternate day. The college has bought few books for the purpose of those students, who wanted to read the law books in Marathi, and then in English. Few faculties have prepared their power-point slides of their subjects in dual language i. e. English and Marathi. Also, the mode of interaction in class teaching is in dual language. Intra collegiate moot court competition is started wherein the student participants can opt Marathi language for arguments as mooters in the competition. OBSTACLES FACED/ PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED: - The faculty faced the problem in translating the laws to local language, understand the basic tenets of law in local language, which were not gone through the faculty themselves as well, however very shortly this defect too was came over by the faculty. IMPACT OF PRACTISE/ EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS: - The result of the practise is that, the students were referring to the words written on white board, getting noted these words on their note book, increase in subscription of Marathi books were observed. Student, who were slow learners in class has started gradually understanding the concept in English and started getting involved in classroom discussions, did not remain slow learners. Moreover, during pandemic, when students were asked to compulsorily not visit the institute, they were requesting the college authority to adopt a way, so that they can get more knowledge of Latin terminologies, English

terminologies. Accordingly, Principal himself has undertaken the task to to create a Telegram Public Group which shall be open for all. Since the creation of group, various reading materials, English Legal words, with its Marathi Meaning, Latin Maxim have been

7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

The college is well known for "best infrastructure availability in law college" in the vicinity. The college has it's own two buildings, one for classes, office administrative work and another independent building for library with research centre, reading room (General), reading room for girls, an indoor multipurpose hall. The college has its own gymnasium and state of the art indoor sports complex. The college being recognised Ph.D. research centre, affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded so many faculties teaching at other institutes are attached with this institute and ever wonder about the infrastructure availability at the institute. Also, the invited guests, imminent personalities, legal luminaries, members of Nanded Bar Association and judicial officers appreciates the infrastructural facilities available in college. Academically, the college provides highest merits in university, moreover in all competitive examinations, the graduates of this college are having upper hand in their selection, owing to the teaching method adopted by this institute. Besides, although being single faculty college, still the college is known for the highest student's strength in the university. The college also has highest students' strength amongst the law colleges affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University. So also, the college has highest registered research candidates of the university pursuing Ph.D. in law. The faculties (research guides) teaching at neighbouring institute are registered with the research centre of college. The library consists of more than 37000 books including text books, commentaries reference books along with some well-known journals like All India Reporter, Criminal Law Journal, Maharashtra Law Journal etc. In all thirteen classrooms of the institute have multimedia projector installed in it. So that, the students should get an ICT education. All teachers at the institution are well versed with ICT model of education and thus uses the PowerPoint presentation as a method of teaching along with chalk and talk method. Because of the interactive presentation of the subject in a digital medium, now students are getting more clear idea of the course contents being taught. The institute is situated in a region, which is not known for its educational qualities, however overcoming that, this is the only institute in the nearby places, which has these many projectors installed in classrooms. Students, who seek admission in this college, have earlier attended the colleges, which do not have this much good infrastructure, thus getting more attracted to seat in the classroom.
